Application Procedures	At present, Cornell will send a PDF application form to the Partner School representative, who gives it to the School's nominees. The application must be sent directly to Dawne Peacock at <u>law.jdexchange@cornell.edu</u> together with:
	 a) an official transcript of your university legal studies; b) a letter of nomination from the appropriate official at your home school; c) a one-page Statement discussing your academic interests and proposed course of study at Cornell; d) Students from non-English-language schools must provide information demonstrating English language competence equivalent to a minimum TOEFL score of at least 600 (paper-based test), 250 (computer-based test), or 100 (Internet-based test) but higher TOEFL scores are recommended; e) a current resume and f) two passport-size color photographs: Students need to upload photo using Cornell new student site in order for it to go onto ID card. If they do not upload a photo, they will need to go to Day Hall during Orientation and have photo taken and get ID card. Credits per study period	Exchange students must have their course load approved by their home institution. For Cornell students, a normal load would be 12-14 credits per semester. Cornell students may take up to 17 credits a semester, but this would be a very difficult course load for an international student. Even 12-14 credits would be difficult for some exchange students. Please work with your home school to determine the appropriate level for you.
Average credit per course	Varies: 1-4
Number of courses offered per study period	70—80
Number of hours per week for each course	1-4
Total number of hours for each course	Depends on the number of credits. On average, classes meet a total of 700 minutes for each one credit. For example, a 3-credit course will meet for a total of 2100 minutes (or 35 hours) over the course of the semester.
